




INTRODUCTION TO THE LANCASHIRE DISABILITY PATHWAY

Lancashire Cricket Foundation manages the disability pathway for girls and boys from junior recreational level up to senior county representation.

Nationally run next step programme for those leaving All Stars or starting their cricketing journey for **8 to 11 vear olds**.

SEND PROGRAMME

What is it?

Coaching and participation opportunities in schools for both **Softball Cricket** and **Table Cricket**.

Various schools across Lancashire.

What is it?

FREE, softball community cricket sessions for 12 to 25 year-olds with a range of disabilities.

Where is it?

Various towns and cities across Lancashire.

SUPER 9S

What is it?

Development-focussed county cricket, bridging the gap between Super 1s cricket and traditional hardball cricket.

An opportunity for aspiring disability cricketers to develop skills and represent Lancashire.

What is it?

Competitive hardball county cricket in ECB competitions.

The Lancashire D40 side is our disability performance squad for players who are deaf, have learning disabilities or physical disabilities.
